The AUC Press offices, located on the AUC Tahrir Campus, have been temporarily closed over the past couple of weeks, but we hope to resume business as usual



in the coming days. However, we have decided to postpone the planned Tahrir Holiday Book Fair until early in 2012. In the meantime, we will hold a [Zamalek Holiday Book Fair](#) from December 9 to 12 at the AUC Zamalek Hostel (located at 16 Mohamed Thakeb Street). It will feature many of the new AUC Press publications, including latest editions of the Tahrir Studies publications, bestsellers, bargains, and discounts.

This month also brings the annual [Naguib Mahfouz Medal for Literature award](#) ceremony, held every year on December 11, [the birthday of Naguib Mahfouz](#), Egypt's iconic Nobel laureate. This year the AUC Press marks the celebration of the centenary of the great writer's birth with the special publication of the limited-edition 20-volume [Naguib Mahfouz Centennial Library](#), containing all the published English translations of his work. In this milestone year, the [Mahfouz award event will be held at the El Sawy Cultural Wheel in Zamalek](#), beginning at 5pm with the announcement of this year's award, followed by a round table discussion with leading Egyptian writers and literary critics on the topic of "Naguib Mahfouz and Revolutionary Literature."

Meanwhile, we have recently published some wonderful new books: Miral al-Tahawy's acclaimed [Brooklyn Heights](#), winner of the 2010 Naguib Mahfouz Medal for Literature; Mourid Barghouti's [I Was Born There, I Was Born Here](#), the long-awaited follow-up to the Palestinian's poet's first memoir, [I Saw Ramallah](#) (AUC Press, 2003); Hassouna Mosbahi's [A Tunisian Tale](#), an unconventional

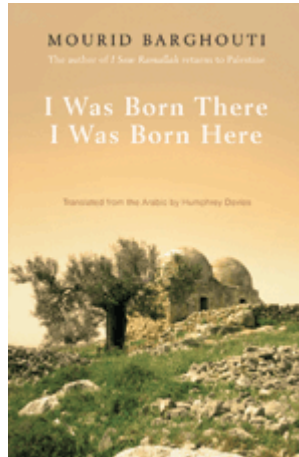

Miral al-Tahawy, translated by Samah Selim

Egyptian author Miral al-Tahawy is the winner of the 2010 Naguib Mahfouz Medal for Literature. The English translation of her latest modern Arabic novel, [Brooklyn Heights](#), which was also shortlisted also for the 2011 "Arab Booker" prize, comes just in time for this year's Naguib Mahfouz Centennial celebrations.

In this novel, the protagonist Hind, newly arrived in New York with her eight-year-old son, several suitcases of unfinished manuscripts, and hardly any English, finds a room in a Brooklyn teeming with people like her who dream of becoming writers. As she discovers the various corners of her new home, they conjure up parallel memories from her childhood and her small Bedouin village in the Nile Delta. Through a kaleidoscopic spectrum of disadvantaged characters we encounter unique but familiar life histories in this intensely moving novel of displacement and exile. [More >>](#)

[I Was Born There, I Was Born Here](#)

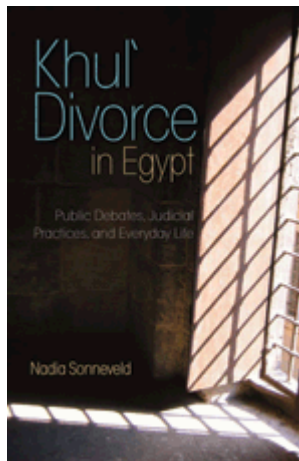
Mourid Barghouthi, translated by

In 1996 Palestinian poet Mourid Barghouthi went back to his home for the first time since exile following the Six-Day War in 1967, and wrote a poignant and incisive account of the exile's lot in the acclaimed memoir [I Saw Ramallah](#). In 2003 he returned to Ramallah to introduce his Cairo-born son, Tamim Barghouthi, to his

Palestinian family. [I Was Born There, I Was Born Here](#) traces Barghouthi's own life in recent years and in the past—his early life in Palestine, his expulsion from Cairo and exile to Budapest, marriage and the birth of his son, Tamim, and then the young man's own expulsion from Cairo—and tells the story of the Palestinian journey of father and son. "Barghouthi renders the world with rare exactitude. He checks statement with humility and attempts to resist an Occupation that 'imprisons time inside space' by writing about the place itself," comments The Independent's Guy Mannes-Abbott. "It's an honest confrontation with Israeli violence and impunity, an unflinching description of the Palestinian Authority's compromising failures, and a plea for joy." [More >>](#)

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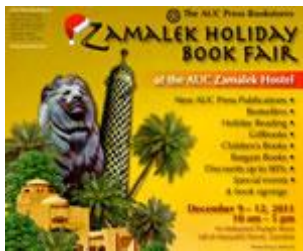
[Khul' Divorce in Egypt: Public Debates, Judicial Practices, and Everyday Life](#)

At the beginning of the twenty-first century, Egyptian women gained the unique right to divorce their husbands unilaterally through a procedure called *khul'*. This has been a controversial application; notwithstanding attempts to present the law as being grounded in Islamic law,

opponents claim that *khul'* is a privileged women's law, and a western conspiracy aimed at destroying Egyptian family life and, by extension, Egyptian society. In this ethnographic study, Sonneveld explores the nature of the public debate where in films and cartoons, women and the institution of *khul'* are ridiculed. The author, in her concluding remarks, writes about her findings that "the main consumers of *khul'* in the study were women from the lower and lower-middle classes" as they often come from small families and do not have male relatives to defend their marital claims.
